School Entrance and Exit

I have had a further update from the Council and they are looking into improving the entrance to the school site for us. I have asked for a raised ramp and barrier to be change on the corner of the school site to allow the children to step straight from the pathway into the car park. I have received the following graphic impression of how it may look: -



This will mean that we will be able to open the gate in the mornings and allow the children to step straight onto the car park. We will also purchase some further barriers to allow stop vehicle access to the car park during the start and end of the day. It will also allow us to continue to keep use of the one-way system which makes entering and exiting the school far more efficient.

Can I please remind parents/carers, particularly at the end of the day, to exit via the path and side gate. I understand that some parents may find this frustrating and would prefer to use the car park as it is quicker.

The sole reason for this is that it sets a bad example to the Year 5/6 children who leave school unaccompanied on their own at the end of the school day – they are often excited at the end of the school day and I do not want them running straight onto the road when they are not paying full attention to the traffic.

I appreciate the vast majority of you do this and are understanding of this reason - if you could pass this message on to anyone else collecting the children it would be much appreciated.

There are a few school improvements which will make your exit more efficient which I will elude to in the next section.





School Yard Improvements

I am happy that we may now begin to improve the yard and facilities over the coming term. I have engaged contractors to remove the metal fencing surrounding the yard, level off the drop to the field and make good the areas that need replacing. I have also met with the school council in order to decide which markings and games they would like marked on the yard. We will also install some seating/benches etc and a bike/scooter shelter at the far end to store these properly. It will make the yard a bit brighter for the children and give them games to play during break – I've always thought that there were prison exercise yards that looked more welcoming than ours!

The vast majority of this will be funded by the money raised by Last Year's School Councillors who had almost £3,500 in the bank by the time that they ended their term in office. This year's councillors have decided that they would like to erect a plaque with the names of their predecessors somewhere to mark their work during the previous year and I think that's a lovely idea – it really helps our children understand them impact they can have on their school.

Removal of the fencing should also make exiting the site at the end of the day easier.

School Uniform

Just a reminder that any earrings should be removed before entering school. Clear plastic retainers may be worn to preserve the holes.

Please ensure the children arrive to school in correct school uniform and PE kit – including black school shoes, not trainers.

Please remember, we have a significant amount of pre-owned school uniform, most of which is in excellent condition, stored in the caretaker's bungalow. If you would like to request some uniform – free of charge – please speak to Mrs Shortt or Mrs Jobling and they will be happy to help.

Activities/Trips etc

Please remember that the cost of one of these will never be prohibitive to the children taking part in one of these events. If you are struggling with the cost of living, please speak to us in confidence and we will support any of our families in whatever way we can.

A-Star Attendance

As part of the Bishop Bewick Catholic Education Trust, we have been enrolled on a trial attendance monitoring scheme with A-Star attendance. It will support us in school in





monitoring attendance levels and supporting children in achieving all they are capable by being in school as often as possible.

A-Star attendance uses a traffic light system and attendances will be categorised as follows:

Attendance %	Colour
96% and above	Green
90% - 95.9%	Amber
Below 90%	Red

Where a child's attendance falls below 96%, parents/carers will receive a letter explaining next steps. We ask you to work with the school to ensure your child attends every day.

Our target for all pupils is to be above 97%

I would also ask that children continue to arrive punctually.

All holidays should be booked outside of school times. Parents should note that the vast majority requests for leave of absences will be rejected in line with the school Leave of Absence Policy.

<u>Clubs</u>

The vast majority of Clubs have started up again this week, beginning with Show Club and Coding Club on Monday.

In the Summer term, we will be able to run more than one club at a time when we have access to the outdoor space as well. This will include some cricket/athletics/multisport etc.

I am also delighted that we will be able to offer children the chance to learn a musical instrument. Those who expressed and interest will begin their guitar lessons with Mrs Owen next week.

Length of the School Day

The Department for Education has introduced the expectation for all state-maintained school to have a minimum school week length of 32.5 hours by September 2023. At present, we are currently 25 minutes in total short of that expectation so we will be changing the opening/closing times to meet this requirement in the coming months. A full consultation process for parents/carers will follow with our intended changes in the near future to outline our plans to meet this requirement. I don't envisage and significant changes to the start/end times of the school day.
