PROTOCOL FOR STAFF SHOWING COVID-19 SYMPTOMS SEPT 2020

Any adult displaying symptoms must inform Headteacher immediately and be sent home. They are asked to request a test.

School inform Council's public health team of all symptomatic persons by emailing: publichealthincidentalalerts@northumberland.gov.uk

Staff member who has helped child or adult does not need to go home unless symptomatic or person tests positive.

Area to be cleaned. PPE to be worn during process.

TEST RESULTS

NEGATIVE

POSITIVE

If they feel well and no longer have symptoms similar to COVID-19 they can return to school.

All members of that bubble to be sent home to self-isolate for 14 days.

Confirmed cases of Covid-19 should be recorded via ANVIL, as they may be RIDDOR reportable.

The other household members of the wider bubble do not need to self-isolate unless the child they live with subsequently develops symptoms.



PROTOCOL FOR CHILD SHOWING COVID-19 SYMPTOMS SEPT 2020

Any child displaying symptoms will be isolated from the rest of the class and will be cared for by an adult until collected by parent.

Parent will arrange for child to be tested and remains at home until results received. Parents to inform school immediately of results.

Parent refuses to get child tested.

Staff and children from that class self-isolate for 14 days.

Child tested

NEGATIVE

POSITIVE

School send home children in that bubble and those who have had contact with COVID positive child. All are to self-isolate for 14 days.

The other household members of the wider bubble do not need to self-isolate unless the child they live with subsequently develops symptoms.
